

FOREWORD FOREMAN



UN75: SHAPING OUR FUTURE TOGETHER TO LEAVE NO ONE BEHIND

In January 2020, the United Nations launched the global consultation to mark its 75th anniversary. Through surveys and dialogues, it asked people about their hopes and concerns for the future, representing the UN's most ambitious effort to date to understand citizens' expectations beyond 2020, as well as the role of international cooperation and the UN in particular. It was also the largest survey to date on priorities for recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

By September 2020, more than one million people from all countries and all walks of life had taken part. Their answers provide unique insights into what the public wants at this challenging time for the world. The report that the Secretary-General António Guterres presented to the General Assembly in September highlighted that, across regions, ages and social groups, respondents were broadly united in their priorities for the future. First, amid the current COVID-19 crisis, the immediate priority for most respondents is improved access to basic services: healthcare, safe water, sanitation and education, followed by greater international solidarity and increased support to those hardest hit. This includes tackling inequalities and rebuilding a more inclusive economy. Looking to the future, the overwhelming concerns are the climate crisis and the destruction of our natural environment. Other priorities include ensuring greater respect for human rights, settling conflicts, tackling poverty and reducing corruption.

Venezuela joined this conversation with more than 7,100 people who responded to the global survey. In addition, the UN Country Team promoted the conversation through initiatives dedicated to UN75, such as the contest launched with El Sistema *Composing your Future*, which invited young composers to create a piece that would inspire action to build a better future; a blogging space dedicated to building a better future in the newspaper El Universal to which representatives of UN Agencies, Funds and Programs, as well as experts and invited

citizens contributed; and a televised concert on Venevisión that brought together citizen voices, artists, influencers and experts to highlight the broad social participation that characterized the 75th anniversary. We also spoke with more than 350 people via zoom and face to face in meetings dedicated to listening to communities, women, youth, the elderly, indigenous peoples, the private sector and academia.

Their views and priorities are compelling: the first is universal access to basic services such as health, water, sanitation, comprehensive education and the internet; the second is increased support for the communities most affected by COVID-19; and the third is more solidarity among people and countries. Other priorities that emerged strongly are: the fight against poverty and inequality, gender equality and the eradication of violence against girls and women, combating the climate crisis, equal rights among individuals and more equality among countries, and respecting the self-determination and identity of peoples. In addition, we have confirmed that to achieve this, multilateralism and international cooperation have never been more important than today.

This document contains the results of an initiative characterized by dialogue, listening and learning, which calls for urgent action to address the root causes of inequality and the factors of instability. With the consequences of the pandemic in sight, it is time to make the principle of *leaving no one behind* a reality, and to commit ourselves to building back better in order to emerge from this crisis more humane and sustainable.

Throughout the year, we heard words of resilience and hope for overcoming challenges. Leaving no one behind in times of the pandemic means that the life of a patient with COVID-19 is saved and that people with other diseases continue to be cared for; that families have water, light and sufficient income to ensure food; that children and adolescents

can continue their education; that older adults are protected; that women are protected from gender-based violence; that indigenous peoples have access to basic social services; that migrants are cared for with dignity on their way home; and that young people can develop positive perspectives for their future.

Our commitment to making the 2030 Agenda's promise of *leaving no one behind* is with them: those who weave peace, unity, solidarity, and sustainable development in their communities every day. We make this report available to all actors, national and international, inviting them to learn about the opinions and priorities defined, enforce together that commitment and redouble the efforts to build a Venezuela that responds to the aspirations of its people.

THE UN75 SURVEY:

The survey **www.un75.online** was launched in January 2020 in 64 languages to listen to as many people as possible around the world. It gathered their priorities for the future, the obstacles to achieving them and the role of global cooperation in furthering them.

In April 2020, a question was added about recovering from the COVID-19 pandemic, and whether the pandemic had changed people's views on the importance of global cooperation. In addition, to ensure that those not connected through the internet were heard, the survey was adapted to capture data offline through a mobile application, and through integration with SMS and other tools such as UNICEF's U-Report.

By September 2020, when Secretary-General António Guterres presented the first report to member states during the General Assembly, more than one million people had responded to the survey.

As the survey is voluntary, it is not necessarily representative. However, it includes a broad and diverse sample of respondents permitting quantitative analysis which led to meaningful results. UN country teams around the world and their partners made great efforts to promote this powerful tool for popular consultation.

In Venezuela, the UN Country Team launched a campaign inviting citizens to respond to the survey and promoting broad participation. UNHCR, FAO, OCHA, IOM, UNAIDS, UNDP, UNFPA, PAHO/WHO, UNICEF, UNV, UNESCO-IEASALC and the Resident Coordinator's Office (RCO) activated their voices by highlighting the importance of the global conversation, and promoted the voices of partners, civil society organizations, influencers and citizens from all over Venezuela, who participated in the survey and invited the public to give their opinions and

contribute to defining the world's priorities. In alliance with the newspaper El Universal, more than 35 blogs of representatives of the UN Agencies, Funds and Programs in Venezuela, together with experts, influencers and invited citizens were published in a section dedicated to UN75 promoting the debate on the construction of a better future. This initiative highlighted issues such as comprehensive education, inclusive societies, gender equality and women's empowerment, food security, sustainable production and consumption, sexual and reproductive rights, humanitarian action, peace, lessons from HIV to overcome COVID-19, the reduction of maternal mortality, the eradication of adolescent pregnancy and feminicide, safe migration, children's rights, as well as cooperation and multilateralism to strengthen the collective response to these challenges.



PRIORITIES FOR ACTION

The results of this global consultation launched by the United Nations on the occasion of its 75th anniversary show a world on the edge, with crises exacerbated by the pandemic, but clear in its aspirations. Across regions, ages and social groups, respondents were broadly united in their priorities for the future:

- 1. Amid the current COVID-19 crisis, the immediate priority for most respondents is improved access to basic services - healthcare, safe water, sanitation and education.
- 2. Greater international solidarity and increased support to those hardest hit. This includes tackling inequalities and rebuilding a more inclusive economy.
- 3. Looking to the future, the overwhelming concerns are the climate crisis and the destruction of our natural environment.
- 4. Other priorities include ensuring greater respect for human rights, settling conflicts, tackling poverty and reducing corruption.

PERCEPTIONS OF THE UN

- · Over 87% of respondents believe global cooperation is vital to deal with today's challenges, and that the pandemic has made international cooperation more urgent.
- Seventy-five years after its founding, six in 10 respondents believe the UN has made the world a better place. Looking to the future, 74% see the UN as "essential" in tackling the challenges.

 However, respondents want the UN to change and innovate: to be more inclusive of the diversity of actors in the 21st century, and to become more transparent, accountable and effective.









To the question What should the international community prioritize to better recover from the pandemic? Venezuelans responded: first, prioritize universal access to health;

second, increase support to the most affected countries and communities; and third, strengthen solidarity among peoples and nations. Here are the results:


To build a better future, the three things that Venezuelans would most like to see are: greater protection of the environment; greater

Taking a longer view, if you picture the world you want in 25 years, what three things would you most want to see?




On the global trends that will most affect the future, Venezuelans first pointed to climate change and environmental problems, health-

related risks, and armed conflict and politically motivated violence, among others:


Which of these global trends do you think will most affect our future?



How important – or not – is it for countries to work together to manage the above trends?




Has Covid-19 changed your views on cooperation between countries?

DIALOGUES

UN75

The UN75 dialogues were informal and formal conversations in which participants explored the 1-minute survey questions in depth, discussed priorities, concerns and solutions to the major global challenges, in line with the interests of their communities.

In Venezuela, the United Nations Country Team held 20 dialogues with more than 350 people from seven key groups: youth, women, communities, volunteers, indigenous peoples, academia, and the private sector.





SUMMARY OF RESULTS

More than 350 people participated in 20 digital and face-to-face conversations with the United Nations in Venezuela.

Their views reflect a world with:

- 1. Universal access to basic services such as health, water, sanitation, comprehensive education and internet.
- 2. Reduce inequalities among population groups.
- 3. Inclusive societies that fulfill the rights of all people, including LGBTI and people with disabilities.

- 4. Greater protection for the planet.
- 5. Peace and equality among countries.
- 6. Gender equality and no violence against girls and women.
- 7. Multilateralism and international cooperation.
- 8. A world with more unity and solidarity that meets the needs of those most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and of vulnerable population.







The United Nations spoke with 150 young people including Model United Nations (MUN) students from public and private universities who spoke with UNHCR, UNAIDS, UNFPA and the RCO; young people from 13 organizations nationwide with UNFPA in a dialogue entitled "8 million reasons"; young social leaders from the Grupo Alpha Civil Association and digital entrepreneurs with UNDP and the Impact Hub; young social entrepreneurs from Reto U, a nationwide Rotary Club, Social Alliance Venamcham and Mercantil Foundation program that promotes projects to support the achievement of the SDGs, who spoke with the RCO, and young students from public and private universities who held a conversation with UNESCO-IESALC and the RCO.

Young people discussed, among others, the global challenges posed by conflict and violence, inequalities and new technologies. In the meeting with UNFPA «8 million reasons», youth addressed their core concerns about education, including sexual education, life opportunities and dreams, human rights, and diversity, as well as their empowerment and mobilization.

PRIORITIES FOR BUILDING A BETTER FUTURE

- 1. Promote equal rights and access to opportunities, basic goods and services (health, employment, education), including the new inequalities generated by the Fourth Industrial Revolution.
- 2. Invest in knowledge, development of new sets of skills and in education that responds to the needs of the 21st century to harness the potential of technology and turn it into an opportunity.
- 3. Promote sustainable development as the key to reduce conflict and violence. Renew the United Nations, reformulate treaties and address new threats to security.



- Promote more citizen participation in key decision making for sustainable development, as well as democratic governments that guarantee social justice and welfare programs with a longterm vision.
- Build societies free from all types of including gender-based violence, violence.

Renown specialists took part of these dialogues, such as the prominent Latin American sociologist Fernando Calderón, who gave a magisterial conference on the mega trends, challenges and opportunities for development, and on the main findings of his most recent book, written with Manuel Castells, "A New Latin America" (Fondo de Cultura Económica, 2019). Also, young Venezuelan leaders had the opportunity to interact with George Gray Molina, UNDP senior economist, who presented a set of reflections on the world outlook for 2045 and the critical and urgent decisions that must be taken in response to the COVID-19 pandemic to promote development.

As part of the United Nation's growing efforts to reiterate its commitment to youth empowerment, an exchange was held with the Secretary-General's Envoy on Youth, Jayathma Wickramanayake, during which young leaders got to know the main aspects of the UN Youth Strategy, which serves as the framework to address the needs and promote youth rights around the world. During the meeting, the young leaders reflected on the important role that youth play in the prevention and resolution of conflicts, as well as in the efforts to maintain and consolidate peace at international level.

These dialogues were specially designed to promote the participation and commitment of young political leaders with the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, and in particular with the SDG16 which seeks to consolidate peace, justice and strong institutions, in line with the Youth, Peace and Security agenda promoted by the United Nations worldwide.





The UNHCR Guasdualito Office, along with its partner Fogones y Bandera, carried out an intergenerational discussion in Puerto Ayacucho with the Jivi and Baré indigenous ethnic groups from Platanillal and Coromoto, Amazonas, with whom they work, to find out their vision of the future.

People between the ages of 24 and 74, teachers, volunteers, community leaders, community members and chefs discussed



the identity of indigenous peoples, selfsustainability and resilience, as well as community empowerment.



digital, humanitarian, community and gender sectors in different regions of the country who held a conversation with Feminismo, Inc. and UNDP; girls, teenagers and retired women, workers who care for the elderly, from feminist and LGBTI organizations, peasant women, afro-descendants, communal and indigenous women who held a conversation with the Foundation Género con Clase and the RCO: and middle-aged women, women over 60, human rights defenders, who held a dialogue with Convite and the RCO, agreed that the future of the world is feminine.

The various groups discussed, among others, the challenges posed by inequality, including gender inequality; conflict and violence; demographic changes, and new technologies.

PRIORITIES FOR BUILDING A BETTER FUTURE:

- 1. Generate changes in the structures and behaviors that legitimize and generate inequality in the public and private spheres.
- 2. Recognize violence against girls and women as a problem for development, education, justice and human rights, and design comprehensive programs to address it.
- 3. Guarantee access to basic services such as health, water, sanitation, and electricity for all, and in particular for women, rural women and older persons.



LISTEN TO THE OPINIONS, IDEAS, AND PRIORITIES OF THE PARTICIPANTS

Women are optimistic about the future. Progress in the fulfilment of women's rights was identified as the legacy of women who have fought for the recognition and exercise of these rights. There has been progress, but much remains to be done. They concluded that it is important to maintain a critical perspective that strengthens and promotes the achievements in a continuous struggle for gender equality in the world.

In their proposals for a better future, women are convinced that the future of the world is feminine. The way forward is to eradicate structural and functional discrimination against women in all spheres of life, especially the cultural, economic and political spheres, in order to achieve gender equality and a better future for all.

VENEZUELA SUSTAINABILITY BUSINESS FORUM 2020

More than 100 national and international companies joined the United Nations in a dialogue focused on sustainability. The Venezuela 2020 Sustainability Business Forum defined five keys to guide an action agenda with the aim of accelerating the achievement of the SDGs as part of the Decade of Action and UN75:

- 1. Commitment with the country: the initiatives shared during the forum show an active private sector committed to the country, that continues working in the context of COVID-19. Communicate more on what is being done in this context and the SDG contributions of small, medium and large companies is key to strengthening actions and joining forces.
- 2. Adaptation, updating and reinvention: the SDGs are the roadmap, and the "new normal" projects a horizon that differs from a back-to-business scenario, that focuses on a medium and longterm future that promotes human rights, decent employment and the environment, principles of the United Nations Global Compact, among others.

- 3. Alignment of the core business with the SDGs: sustainability is good business and projects companies as agents of economic growth and social change.
- 4. Prioritize urgent sustainable development actions and promote medium and long-term ones: project guiding agreements that place the human being at the center of actions to address urgent needs of SDGs such as an end to poverty, zero hunger, health and well-being, education; and at the same time promote medium and long-term SDG solutions such as industry, innovation and infrastructure; production, responsible consumption, and action for the climate.
- 5. Partnerships and agreements to multiply impacts that meet the country's needs: develop a macro perspective, increasing the impact through partnerships and public-private agreements at the national and local levels. Joining efforts is the first step towards accelerating the SDGs in the country.

THE PRIVATE SECTOR AND SUSTAINABILITY IN VENEZUELA

This innovative space for dialogue and exchange of experiences among socially responsible companies generated synergies and spaces for action together with the Agencies, Funds and Programs of the United Nations in Venezuela, including UNICEF, UNFPA, FAO, UNDP, UNIDO, and the Global Compact, UN WOMEN and the Global Reporting Initiative to promote sustainability, with the aim of achieving inclusive economic and social growth, with gender equality and in harmony with the planet, recovering to build a better future in the demanding context of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Venezuelan Sustainability Business Forum has been profiled as a space for dialogue and action that will take place annually in the country, organized jointly with the private sector, and that will promote the definition of joint and collaborative action for accelerating the SDGs.



Composing your Future



LEARN MORE ABOUT THE INSPIRATION BEHIND EACH PIECE



Young Venezuelans inspired the world to build a better future through the transformative power of music. On the occasion of the 75th anniversary of the United Nations, the UN Country Team in Venezuela and "El Sistema", the National System of Youth and Children's Orchestras and Choirs of Venezuela, launched the contest "Composing Your Future", which invited musicians between the ages of 18 and 30 to compose a piece in the symphonic and choral-symphonic genre, inspired by the central theme of "The Future We Want".

Living in harmony with the planet, fulfilling human rights, education, love, equality, solidarity, the right of children to live a happy life, perseverance and hope for a better future are some of the messages that inspired 32 young composers to write the new music that will inspire the world to build a better future together.

THE WINNING AUTHORS AND THEIR MESSAGES

The works awarded from the cities of Barquisimeto, Upata and Los Teques were created by three young composers of great talent who inspired the jury with their proposals: Julio Landaeta, winner of the first place with the work "Laberinto Encantado" (Enchanted Labyrinth); Fernando Rivas of the second place with the work "Epifanías del cataclismo" (Epihanies of the Cataclysm) and Jorge Díaz of the third place with the work "Amaliyaca".

"My work is inspired by the theory of the great metaphysical master of the 20th century Neville Goddard, from whom I have learned the feeling of desire fulfilled. If I stumble, I get up and go on with resilience and perseverance." Julio Landaeta.

The jury, composed by Peter Grohmann, Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator of the UN in Venezuela, Eduardo Méndez, Executive Director of El Sistema, and world-renowned maestros Lourdes Sánchez, Alfredo Rugeles, Pablo Castellanos, Orlando Cardozo and Rodolfo Saglimbeni, examined a total of 32 musical proposals from all regions of the country, taking into account factors such as orchestration, organology, discourse, textures, writing, theme and the general vision of each work.

The virtual award ceremony consisted of delivering certificates to the first, second and third place, accompanied by a symbolic prize, a ceremony that highlighted the opinions of young composers and their key messages.

DOING MUSIC IN THE **TIME OF COVID-19**

The ambitious project of giving life to the winning piece, an unpublished composition, consisted in making the performance of 65 young musicians from the Simón Bolívar 45th Anniversary Orchestra possible, in accordance with the rules of distance to prevent COVID-19. This task was possible thanks to the world-class educational, artistic and professional team of El Sistema, which also had the collaboration of recognized professionals such as a team of sound and editing engineers who have worked with institutions such as the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Hollywood Bowl.

Young people who participated in the contest inspired the world with their messages and music to build a better future. Together with El Sistema, the United Nations celebrated the culmination of this initiative, highlighting the joint work in promoting the rights and development of Venezuelan children and vouth.

The UN and El Sistema have a longstanding partnership working in the promoting of social inclusion, peace and the resilience of children and youth in Venezuela. Among other initiatives, El Sistema is UNDP Promoter of Sustainable Human Development and UNICEF National Goodwill Ambassador.

More than one million children and youth are part of El Sistema, set up through 443 centers and 1704 modules throughout the country in urban and rural areas of Venezuela, making the plan for social transformation that Maestro Abreu dreamed of in 1975 a reality. The artistic and educational model has been replicated in more than 70 countries, giving access to the arts, culture and music to millions of children and young people around the world.

On its 75th anniversary, the United Nations promoted social inclusion and the rights of children and youth with El Sistema.





UN75 CONCERT



The United Nations celebrated its 75th anniversary with a concert entitled "Building a better future to leave no one behind," which was broadcast on Saturday, November 14 at 9 PM on Venevisión. The program was made up of citizen voices from all walks of life, more than 12 artists and musical groups, personalities and representatives of the United Nations Agencies, Funds and Programs in Venezuela, who expressed their opinions on the global priorities that we need to face as a human family in order to shape a better future.

Guaco, Kobi Cantillo, Huáscar Barradas, Sharlene Taulé, Aquiles Báez, C4Trío, Jhoabeat, Maleh, Gran Radio Riviera, Aditus and El Sistema, with the winning piece of the contest Composing your Future "El Laberinto Encantado" by Julio Landaeta interpreted by the Simón Bolívar Orchestra 45th Anniversary, are some of the artists who raised their voices in favor of a better future, joining the more than 7,100 women, indigenous peoples, communities, musicians, young people, students, seniors, volunteers, social organizations, academic and private sectors that have participated in the largest conversation in the world from all over Venezuela.

THE FUTURE WE WANT, THE UN WE NEED

UN75 represents the organization's most ambitious attempt to take stock of global reality and hear from "we the peoples" about priorities and solutions to global challenges, providing a unique vision of the future we want and the UN we need.

Global dialogues have called for the UN to innovate, exercise stronger and more consistent leadership in the exercise of its moral authority to defend the Charter of the United Nations. They have made evident the call to increase accountability, transparency and impartiality, including through better communication with communities, as well as through the strengthening of their programs and operations.

The results of this exercise show us a world on the edge, with crises exacerbated by the pandemic, but clear about its aspirations. Across regions, ages, and social groups, respondents broadly agreed on their priorities for the future. Amid the pandemic, the results make a strong call for action on inequalities, climate change as well as more solidarity.

In Venezuela, the opinions and priorities defined to shape a better future are compelling: universal access to basic services such as health, water, sanitation, education and the internet; equality, more inclusive societies that ensure the rights of all people, including LGBTI people and people with different abilities; greater protection for the planet; peace and equality between countries; gender equality and freedom from violence against girls and women; a united and more supportive world that meets the needs of the groups most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and vulnerable populations.

The UN Country Team in Venezuela enabled spaces for dialogue with a great diversity of social groups in the country, which has provided invaluable inputs for the different instruments and plans in its field of action with a view to continuing working towards achieving the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and fulfilling the promise of leaving no one behind.
